OUTDOOR PLAY MAKES KIDS HEALTHY



One in five four-year-olds are obese in the United States. Regular active play during childhood is one of the perfect ways to combat the obesity epidemic. One way to encourage this is nature play, allowing children time to play outdoors. An outdoor play environment should promote development of the child, physically and intellectually. It should also offer experiences that will provide an environment for active learning. An outdoor environment is important for children so they can play with elements such as plants, sand and water. A vegetable garden is also popular. Pick items that are easy to grow such as sugar snap peas, radishes, corn, carrots and potatoes. Try a butterfly garden. Plant flowers like milkweeds and coneflowers. Throw in parsley and dill for caterpillars to eat! Many child care centers in the area, like Precious Moments Childcare Center in Gastonia, are picking up on the trend of nature play. Crystal Davis, Director of Precious Moments said starting a garden was one of the best things that could have happened to the children as well as the staff. "Our hard work really paid off by learning the steps it took, to take care of something

we love doing," Davis said. "We really enjoyed watching the food grow and eating the fresh food that came out of the garden. Our goal is to continue to do a year round garden for the family and staff of Precious Moments Childcare Center."
